Epiphany – a Closer Look at the Three Kings

Welcome to Epiphany! Epiphany (pronounced E-pif-a-nee) is the season after Advent and before Lent. It celebrates the “three Kings” – Magi, including wise men, royalty, leaders, and astrologers, who came from far lands to follow the star to Bethlehem. It may be the least understood of all the seasons in the Christian calendar, the others being Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time. Since this season begins on January 6 and follows into Lent next month, this is the time for a brief explanation of this season and a suggestion of a way to honor it.

The Epiphany Story of the visit of the Magi is a story that demonstrates that Jesus is the Lord of ALL the people of the earth, not just the Jews (they would be horrified at this). Since the Magi are foreigners, they represent us: people who are not Jews yet follow this rabbi Jesus. And they (and us through them) are there from the beginning of the story of Jesus’s life.

It is also a story that honors Jesus as the King of Kings. Although Jesus was born in a stable, the visit of the Magi is the first declaration of his glory and true place as the one to whom all knees bow, on earth as well as in heaven.

It is a story of Jesus as the Light of the World. The Nativity Star showed that the way of Jesus is light, and it was by following light and seeking truth that the Magi found Him where nobody expected.

It is the story of Jesus as the Prince of Peace. This was an international co-operative effort of men from several nations that came to honor Him.

How do we celebrate it? The answer is by following the example of the Magi, who brought gifts to Jesus. We are called to do likewise: to give God gifts. How do we give God a gift when God is the creator of the whole world and we own nothing in his sight? This really is the ultimate example of a problem some of us faced at Christmas: what do you give a person who has everything? In God’s case, that’s a real problem! God really does have everything!

The answer is straightforward: when we give anyone a gift, we give that person what he or she desires. And although God has everything, God desires one thing so much he gave up Jesus to death for it: God desires us. Yes, us.

How do we give ourselves to God? There are actually two ways. It depends on whether our lives are too empty or too full (or both). If our life is too empty, God invites us to turn to Him, deepen our love and commitment to Him, read His Word, talk and listen to Him in prayer, and spend time and energy bringing others to Him. If our life is too full, God invites us to identify something that is leading us away from God and to either eliminate it or redirect it, so that God may have first place in our lives and then all other things will fall into place.

We welcome these dedicated members to these new roles, and we also thank those who have served so faithfully: Deacons Larry Evans and Grace Bradley, and Elders John Garlisch, Sue Evans, and Michele Neff.





New Women's Bible Study

“Being single will kill you faster than obesity” was the title of a NY Post article from August 2017. Despite what that headline suggests, the study that was cited in the article was about loneliness, not singleness. Loneliness does not have a direct, exclusive correlation to singleness. Some of the loneliest people I've met are in committed relationships. However, I admit that both subjects have been swirling in my mind for several decades, with increasing frequency as I age. I have been involved in several “women's bible studies” over the years, hoping to find deep relationships that could have a positive lifelong impact on me. However, I found that most of the studies were geared towards reaching out to un-churched and non-believing neighbors. The rest of us were there as set-dressing to fill in the scene while the program worked to explain the good news and help those women understand what Christ did for us. An extremely important cause!! But I was searching for something different, something a little richer and more profound. A place where believing people would come together to learn more, to dig deeper into Scripture, to share our journeys and our burdens, to encourage and admonish one another.

When Darly recently said something about wanting to do a bible study about women, I was thrilled and jumped right on board. We assumed that this topic would naturally be more interesting to other women and suddenly the Women's Bible Study was underway. YOU, dear reader, are invited to participate. There will be snacks! Please don't feel that you need to have done individual study before class to participate. Come as you are! If you can't make it to every meeting, that's okay too. We're taking the long view of this group and hope to see it change and grow and shrink and evolve in response to our congregation's needs.

The Bible tells us that Jesus said “For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them.” (Matthew 18:20). Paul tells us, through his letter to the Ephesians, to strive for unity and maturity in the body of Christ so that we can build each other up and become mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ. MICAH Disbands



MICAH, which is an acronym for Men In Christ At Heritage, has officially disbanded operations as of the end of December, 2017.

MICAH was the men's group of Heritage. It was founded approximately 20 years ago by John Nelson. Founding members of MICAH who are still with Heritage include Charles Fortney, John Garlisch, Jim Goldbach, Pete Mastro, Nick Shargo, Dan Wennerholm, and Dave Wroth. Many other men participated at other times, or helped with the group in other ways than attending the monthly MICAH meetings.

MICAH activities were centered around three activities: fellowship, mission, and service. In fellowship, MICAH sponsored several sports outings, as recently as 2014. In mission, MICAH sponsored mission fundraising efforts, including an annual bowling event, supporting Children in the Son, a Romanian agency helping abandoned children. In service, MICAH had several construction projects for the church and its members, including visits to Stronghold (a Blackhawk Presbytery camp and retreat center in north-central Illinois).

MICAH's last activities were a contribution of \$125 to the Carol Stream Library Board in March of 2016 in memory of founding member and leader Jim Bailey after his death, and a closing donation of the remaining funds of \$178 to Children in the Son.

Mission Focus: PADS

Heritage shares in proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ through supporting a wide variety of mission projects designed to help our neighbors. In this context, Jesus's definition of "our neighbor" is anyone in need – see Luke 10:25-37. Our "neighbor" is not just someone who lives next to us; some people have no home at all and are still our "neighbors". An organization called PADS responds to that need. PADS is an acronym for "Public Action to Deliver Shelter".

PADS works through various churches in western DuPage County to provide temporary shelter for people who do not have a home. Different churches host the shelters on different nights. Our Savior Lutheran Church, on Army Trail Road, is a PADS host every Wednesday night of each month. Heritage serves with Lutheran Church of the Master the fourth Wednesday of the month to provide food and volunteers. Other area churches provide that support on the other Wednesday nights. Volunteers prepare and serve a substantial evening meal; there is also breakfast the next morning and each person staying at the shelter receives a brown-bag lunch for later in the day. On a typical night, there may be 45-60 men and women.

Heritage members and friends that help at the PADS site and donate food include: Jerry and Joan Knapp, Charles and Kathy Fortney, Sue Wexler, Jan Smith, John Garlisch, Sue Galle, and Victor Harris. Also, Dan Wennerholm, Dave Hamby, and Angel Marquez help make the main dinner course. Jim and Ginny Goldbach, Dawn and Jim Giunti, Patricia Lind, Cheri Schaefer, Nancy Bagdonas, Sue Cory and others from Heritage participate by bringing food and dropping it off at the church, or helping transport food or other donations from Heritage to the site. Without the help of all these volunteers PADS would not be. The guests at PADS are very appreciative.

Thank You! January, in particular, is a terrible time to have no shelter.

About the Newsletter

This Newsletter in 1981

As the pastor who initiated The Good News Letter, I thought I might take this opportunity to share a little with you about its origins.

When I arrived in August of 1981, there was no newsletter. I felt a monthly publication for our members *and prospects* would be a good promotional tool for the church, so I prioritized writing and producing one myself. Beginning with the September, 1981, issue, it was a very amateurish publication that bore the heading: "THE GOOD NEWS LETTER," with the byline beneath it proclaiming, "Building Our Heritage Together." How amateurish was it? On my personal copy, "Vol. 1, No. 1" is *handwritten* under the byline. I forgot to include that in the first printing of our newsletter, but it regularly appeared thereafter. Laurie Fritz, and probably occasionally others, helped send the document through a *mimeograph* machine after I typed the pages onto *stencils*. We could not yet afford a copier. Then we would hand assemble the 4 pages (2 two-sided pages) and staple them together for distribution on the following Sunday morning. Extra copies were produced to have available for visitors, and members were encouraged to take an extra copy to share with a friend or neighbor. Local visitors who provided an address were added to the mailing list until such time as they either joined the church or were determined to not be "prospects." The newsletter proved to be very useful in encouraging folks in the community to come give us a try, and about half those who did visit eventually joined!

That first simple newsletter included the initial "Pastor's 'Pinion," some introductory facts about Linda and me, a word of thanks to the Session for spending 5 hours in their first meeting with me (!), a calendar of upcoming events and services, Sunday School news, an announcement of the church's first youth fellowship meeting, an invitation to the first new member classes, attendance figures for August 23rd and 30th (44 and 33, respectively), "and more." There were no photographs, and the newsletter, admittedly, *remained* a rather amateurish production right up until the time of my departure. It doubled in length over those seven-and-a-half years, but not until we finally got into our own building did we own a copy machine...or have a church secretary!...

The newsletter had been sent out by first class mail (and distributed on Sunday mornings) for several years prior to our creating a long enough list of members and prospects to invest in a bulk rate, but once we exceeded the number necessary (200) to "think big," we went for it. Again the question was asked, "Can we afford to do this?" but again we went out on a limb of faith, and the results answered the question affirmatively: We had to put some money into advertising, and this was still a good tool, along with our promotional brochures. When we canvassed neighborhoods to identify prospects we handed out copies of our brochure and the current newsletter, and added many new families to the mailing list as a result of these efforts.

This Newsletter in 2018

For me, Dave's message about the 1981 newsletter encouraged thoughts about the purpose of the newsletter, who might be reading it, and what people's various needs and expectations could be. Some of the purposes I can think of are:

Guidelines for submission: anybody may write in at any time on any topic having to do with Heritage or the broader church or life as Christians. But to encourage a variety of contributions, ensure timely processing, and help those who are intimidated by a blank screen, I will be inviting individual people to write along with an indication of what I believe might be helpful or useful topics. Nobody is limited to these suggestions; they are merely solicitations and prompts. And if you are not interested in writing, you are always free to decline or to refer the article-writing to someone else.

I welcome all thoughts and comments about the newsletter. Thank you for reading.

Crucified and Risen Play Production Information

Crucified and Risen is the name of the play that the church will be performing on April 19 and 20, 2018. This play is the third installment of a trilogy that began with the *Living Last Supper* and continued with its sequel, the *Trial of Jesus*. As its name implies, this play begins with the activities of Jesus following sentencing by Pilate (focusing on the crucifixion) and continues on to include the resurrection story and the appearances of Jesus to the disciples and others thereafter. It carries the story all the way to the Ascension, when Jesus returned to the Father in heaven.

Although there is a heavy emphasis on the events of Holy Week from Good Friday on, we are not doing it in Holy Week this year. Instead, we are doing it the third week after Easter. The reason we are moving it back is that this play includes events after Easter Sunday.

Patricia Lind and I are pleased to welcome Nancy Bagdonas as the third member of the play leadership. Nancy is the “coordinator”, meaning that she is responsible for co-ordinating all the off-stage aspects of the play. I am sure she will be reaching out to you and your friends for help; please give her the same support and eagerness you have shown to me and Patricia on this and the first two plays in the series. We thank past coordinators Sue GG and Pete and Candy Mastro.

We are announcing a kickoff breakfast for all actors, singers, helpers, and anyone just interested. That breakfast will take place at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday January 27 at the church. At that point, we will provide the script, the music, the casting assignments, the rehearsal schedule (generally Saturday mornings), maybe other things we haven’t thought of yet, and a discussion about how this play is intended to honor God and proclaim the greatest event in the history of the universe: God’s reconciling love and ultimate sacrifice in Jesus Christ, who conquered death that we might live and be restored to a right relationship with God.


